Erind Merkuri, PhD, was born in Durrës, Albania, on October 12, 1984. He received his bachelor's degree in law; completed his master's degree studies in law and the PhD studies in the Faculty of Law of the University of Tirana. In 2008, he joined the Faculty of Law of the University of Tirana as a full time lecturer at the Department of Public Law. His research is focused in areas such as Constitutional Law, Constitutional Justice, Human Rights, Administrative Law, Administrative Justice and Legal History. He has participated in several national and international conferences presenting studies within these areas of interest. His publications tackle various aspects pertaining to the organization and functioning of the Constitutional Court, the reform of the judiciary, human rights as well as the application of International and EU Law principles in the domestic law. Erind is an attorney at law at the "Meksi Law and Consulting" Law Firm. He is a member of the National Selection Committee, which recruits, evaluates and dismisses the top level civil servants in the civil service of Albania, and has participated in several work groups in which he drafted several laws and sub-legal acts in the fields of civil service, delivery of public services and in harmonization of legal and sub-legal acts with the Code of Administrative Procedures. He has participated as an expert for the amendments to the law on the Constitutional Court in 2016 and as an expert on the constitutional amendments regarding the electoral system in 2020. He is fluent in English and Italian.

From 2008, **Klesta Hysi** is a lecturer at the Public Law Department, Faculty of Law, University of Tirana and teaches *Administrative Law, European Administrative Law, Personal Data Protection and Employment Relations in Public Administration*. In 2015, she received the title "docent". Her research work focuses on public administration reforms in Albania and the European integration process, administrative law and administrative justice, civil service in comparative perspective, human rights and public administration. She has participated in numerous national and international scientific conferences, and has several publications within her fields of interest. In addition to the academic activity, Ms. Hysi has been active for 6 years as a trainer for the legal framework and civil service in Albania at the Albanian School of Public Administration. She has offered legal expertise and consultation for institutions such as the Department of Public Administration and the Albanian School of Public Administration. Maps in international security: Revealing the unseeable (2019); Community Perspectives on Preventing Violent Extremism in Bosnia and Hercegovina. Berghof Foundation and Atlantic Initiative (2018); Overcoming the Democratisation Deficit in the Western Balkans: A Road to (No) Where? (2018).

Dana Luša, PhD, is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies, University of Zagreb, Faculty of Political Science. Her primary fields of interests are foreign policy, in particular foreign policies of small European states, IR theory and diplomacy. She served as the vice director of the Postgraduate Study of Foreign Policy and Diplomacy, the vice dean for Science and International Cooperation and an executive editor of the academic journal *Politička misao*. In 2020, she was elected the vice dean for academic and student affairs. During early stages of her career, she held a position of the secretary general of the Atlantic Council of Croatia and the Centre for International Studies as well as of the president of the Youth Atlantic Council of Croatia. Her teaching experience includes courses in International Relations, Diplomacy, US Foreign Policy and Transatlantic Relations at the undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate level. She actively participates at the most relevant international conferences in political science resulting with publications in international peer-reviewed journals. She is the author of a book *Contemporary Application of IR Theories*. Currently she is a researcher at two Erasmus + Jean Monnet Networks.

Ružica Jakešević is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies at the Faculty of Political Science (University of Zagreb). She obtained her MA (2004), M.Sc. (2008) and PhD (2011) degrees from the University of Zagreb. Her scientific and research interests are primarily international relations and security studies, theoretical approaches to security, traditional and contemporary security challenges, national security systems and policies, and their development in national and international context. In addition, these interests include research of the security mechanisms of global and regional international organizations (primarily the UN) in enhancing peace and security in the world, as well as studying the security aspects of ethnic relations and migration issues. She teaches courses at undergraduate and graduate level: International security, National security Policies, Croatia in the European security system, Migration and security at the Faculty of Political Science, as well as Peace support operations and Introduction into security and defence studies at the Croatian military academy “Dr. Franjo Tuđman”. She actively participates and presents at international conferences in Croatia and abroad and has published a number of scientific papers in the field of international relations, security studies and ethnic studies.

Prof. Dr Iliriana Islami is a professor of International Law at the Faculty of Law at the University of Prishtina, and responsible as vice dean on the issue of cooperation between Faculty of Law and other Universities including the responsibility of enhancing the quality of study program. At the same time, she is a coordinator of the Centre for Human Rights, as resource centre at the Faculty of Law. Beforehand, she served as a judge on the Constitutional Court, selected in the first generation of judges with the establishment of the Constitutional Court (2009-2012). Prior to joining the Constitutional Court, Mrs Islami has

worked for the OSCE in the Department of Rule of Law and Human Rights from 2000-2009. During all this time, she was involved in the process of the reform of the Law Faculty, by being coordinator of the bachelor and master degree programmes through Tempus projects in cooperation with the Graz Faculty. Also, she is a lecturer for the Bar exam candidates since 2000. She holds a Ph.D. on International Law. Her thesis was supervised by Prof. Wolfgang Benedek from the Graz University. She completed her master's degree in the Bilkent University (American University) in Ankara (Turkey) and one year of specialization in Utrecht University (Netherlands). She holds a bachelor's degree from the Faculty of Law in Prishtina University. During studies, she was recognized by the rector as a "distinguished student". She is also an author of many publications.

Ass. Prof. Plakolli-Kasumi is the teaching assistant/lecturer of the Law Faculty of the University of Pristina where she teaches courses in commercial law, intellectual property rights and arbitration law. She is specialized in civil and commercial law and has over 15 years of professional experience. Her key working experience includes the work as the legal advisor to the Minister of Infrastructure and Environment, legal manager at the Tax & Legal Department of Deloitte Kosova sh.p.k., and the legal advisor to the Head of the Council of Europe Office in Pristina. She is currently the acting vice dean for International Cooperation and Student Projects at the Law Faculty of the University of Pristina. Mrs Plakolli-Kasumi is the author of a number of publications in her area of expertise and holds an LL.M. degree in International and Comparative Law from the University of Pittsburgh's School of Law. Mrs Plakolli-Kasumi is close to finishing her PhD studies in the field of contract law. She is fluent in Albanian, English, Turkish, and Serbo-Croatian.

Boris Vukićević is an associate professor in the Faculty of Political Science at the University of Montenegro in Podgorica. He graduated from the Faculty of Law at the University of Montenegro in 2005 and obtained his MA and PhD from the Faculty of Political Science at the University of Montenegro, where he has been employed since 2005. He teaches History of Diplomacy, International Relations, International Organizations, International Relations Theories, and Diplomatic and Consular Law. Vukićević studied for periods of time at various foreign universities including the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, University of Vienna and Bard College in New York. He was a participant in several conferences in the former Yugoslav countries, Poland, Italy, Luxembourg, Romania, Bulgaria, Norway, Turkey, Georgia, etc., a member of four electoral monitoring missions in Ukraine, and a senior researcher on various regional projects. His research deals mostly with the history of international relations, comparative Balkan politics, as well as with subjects of contemporary international relations, particularly the Holy See and its foreign policy. He is a member (since 2013) and served as a secretary (2014-2016) of the Center for Young Scientists of the Montenegrin Academy of Sciences and Arts, a member of the Committee for Legal and Political Sciences of Montenegrin Academy of Sciences and Arts, a member of the Editorial Council of the Lexicon of Montenegrin Diplomacy, and served as the chief of masters and PhD studies (2012-2015) and vice dean (2012-2015; 2018) of the Faculty of Political Science in Podgorica. He is the president of the Ethical Board (since 2017), and vice rector of the

University of Montenegro (since 2018). He is the author of numerous academic papers as well as a book on the diplomacy of the Holy See.

Marko Savić holds a master's degree in International Relations and Diplomacy. He is a PhD candidate and a teaching assistant at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Montenegro. His main scientific areas of interest are international relations, geopolitics, power in contemporary international relations, EU politics, Eastern and South-Eastern European politics. He is also an experienced public policy researcher and policy analyst with a history of working on EU funded projects and as a consultant for strategic planning in domestic NGOs and international organizations (UN – UNDP in Montenegro, OSCE/ODIHR, ENEMO). Elena Tilovska-Kechedji, PhD, is an associate professor in political science and diplomacy. Her interests and specialization are in the following areas: International Relations and Diplomacy, Foreign Policy, Foreign Policy of the EU, Integration in the European Union (with specialization in the Balkans) EU Law and Politics, Refugees, Migration and Human Rights, International Law, Political Policies and Theories. She is a vice dean for International Cooperation and Science, and senator at the University Senate. She was granted ERASMUS+ fellowship grant for teaching mobility at the West University of Timisoara, Romania Faculty of Law 2017, was a CEEPUS Coordinator and is a member of International Scientific boards and journals.

Mladen Karadzovski is an associate professor in Public Administration. His research interests and specialization are in the areas of: Administrative Cooperation between the European States, European Integration of Macedonia and Western Balkans, Institutions of European Union, Enlargement Policy of the European Union, Regional Policy of the European Union, Common Foreign and Security Policy of the European Union, Cross-Border Cooperation, Local and Regional Development, Instruments for Pre-Accession. He is also a member of the Advisory Board in the academic Journal Studia Europejskie (European Studies), Warsaw, Poland, from the 5th of June, 2014.

Elena Temelkovska - Anevska was born in 1982 in Bitola. She is an associate professor at the Faculty of Law, University "St. Kliment Ohridski" in Bitola, Republic of North Macedonia. She completed her entire education at the Faculty of Law "Iustinianus Primus", University "Ss. Cyril and Methodius" in Skopje, Republic of North Macedonia. She graduated in 2004, and received her master's degree in International Law and Politics in 2007. In 2011, she supplemented her education with a PhD degree. Her research interests are in the areas of International Public Law, International Private Law, International Relations and Human Rights Law.

Marko Davinić is full professor of Public Law at the Department of Public Law at the University of Belgrade's Faculty of Law. He has obtained his master's and PhD dissertation at the Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade. His main areas of research are Administrative Law, Public Administration and Asylum Law. He teaches several courses including EU Asylum and Immigration Law and Policy. He was Chevening scholar during his PhD research at the Oxford University (2006/07), and JFDP scholar at the George Washington University (2004/05). He participated as an expert on various domestic and international projects, and legal drafting groups. He has published numerous books and articles as an author and co-author in the area of national and comparative administrative law, independent control bodies and asylum law (e.g. *Independent Control Bodies of the Republic of Serbia*, Dosije, Belgrade, 2018; "The Institution of Local Ombudsman in the Republic of Serbia - Success Story or Missed Opportunity?" (co-author I. Krstić), *Lex localis* 3/2018, 551 – 568; *The European Ombudsman and Maladministration*, Protector of Citizens, Belgrade, 2013; "The European Ombudsman – The Champion of Transparency within Brussels Bureaucracy", *Annals of the Faculty of Law in Belgrade, Belgrade Law Review* 3/2013, 119 – 134; "Complexity of Ombudsman Institution Expansion Process", *Law Journal of the Faculty of Law University of Niš* 2011, 101 – 111; "The Importance of the Ombudsman in the Legal System", *Legal Life* 10/ 2007, 717 – 727; *The right to Asylum in International and National Law, Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade*, 2014 (co-author with prof. I. Krstić)).

Branko Rakić attended elementary schools in Ivanjica and in Belgrade. He completed in 1974 and graduated from the XIIth High School in Belgrade in 1979. He received a degree from the Faculty of Law in Belgrade on 13th March 1987 (previously studied French Language and Literature at the Faculty of Philology in Belgrade). He passed his bar examination on 30th June 1989 and obtained a specialist diploma at the European University Centre in Nancy, France (Centre européen universitaire de Nancy) in December 1990 (University Diploma of the third degree) – a "Diploma of High European Studies" ("Diplôme d'études supérieures

européennes ") in the field of European Community Law with the mark "mention honourable". At the University Centre in Nancy (Centre européen universitaire de Nancy), he obtained an MA Diploma "Diploma of Further Studies" ("Diplôme d'études approfondies") in the field of European Community Law, on 4th October 1991. The topic of the 309 pages long MA thesis was "Les aspects juridiques des relations entre la Yougoslavie d'une part et la Communauté européenne et le Conseil de l'Europe de l'autre" (Legal aspects of Relations between Yugoslavia, on the one hand, and the European Communities and the Council of Europe, on the other hand"). By Decision of the Scientific-Didactic Board of the Faculty of Law of the University of Belgrade of 12th February 1993, this diploma was recognised as a masters' degree in Law. On 2nd October 1999, he defended a doctoral thesis at Paris University I - Panthéon Sorbonne under the title: "La présence, les interactions et l'évolution des éléments politiques, économiques et juridiques dans les idées d'intégration européenne jusqu'à la création des Communautés européennes - à la lumière des approches modernes à la réalisation de la paix et du processus moderne d'intégration européenne" ("Presence, interaction and evolution of political, economic and legal elements in ideas of European integration prior to the establishment of the European Communities - in the light of modern approaches to the achievement of peace and modern European integration process") with the mark "mention très honorable" thus obtaining the scientific degree of PhD in Law, in accordance with French regulations (Arrêté ministériel du 30 mars 1992 relatif aux études doctorales). By decision of the Scientific-Didactic Board of the Faculty of Law of the University of Belgrade of 20th December 1999, this diploma was declared equivalent and recognised as the scientific degree of PhD in Law.

Maja Lukić Radović (Mag. iur., Ph.D.) is an associate professor of EU Law at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law. She earned her PhD at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law in 2013 (thesis title: Autonomy of EU Law in Light of Recent Practice of European Courts), and an LL.M. degree from the University Paris 1, Panthéon-Sorbonne, Department of International Law and International Organizations (thesis title: Admissibility of Reservations to International Treaties) in 2002. She passed the Serbian bar exam in 2006, and practiced law in Serbia until 2009. From 2009 until 2011 she was a counsel for the global law firm DLA Piper. While practicing law she regularly handled cases involving gender discrimination in addition to corporate law matters. She teaches several courses at undergraduate, master's and doctoral level: the general course on EU law, International Relations of the EU, Judicial System of the EU, Immigration and Asylum Policy of the EU and Common Agricultural Policy of the EU (within the Master in EU Law program). She gave lectures and presentations in the USA (Harvard Law School), France, Austria, Italy, Germany, Croatia, Macedonia, Montenegro and Albania. Her research interests include the law of international treaties, EU institutional law, EU external relations law, regulation of financial services at the EU level and human rights law. She has published scholarly articles in English, French and Serbian. Her main publications include: Solidarity in European Union Law – the Role and Perspectives, University of Belgrade Faculty of Law 2018, (with particular emphasis on two recent crises – the sovereign debt crisis and the migration crisis, including legal aspects of the impact of the latter on vulnerable categories, including women and children), "The Security Council's Targeted Sanctions in the Light of Recent Developments Occurring in the EU Context", in:

Marija Vlajković, LL.M. (master’s in European Integration, University of Belgrade Faculty of Law), LL.M. (Master 2 in European Studies, specialisation: Droit de la construction européenne, Centre Européen Universitaire de Nancy, Université de Lorraine) is an assistant lecturer at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law. She currently teaches Introduction to the European Integration Law, and takes part in LL.M Course Accession of Serbia to the European Union. Before academia, she gained practical experience in the Ministry of European Integration of the Republic of Serbia (Serbian European Integration Office), Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Serbia (Section for European Union), and Delegation of the European Union to the Republic of Serbia. She is a PhD candidate at the University of Belgrade’s Faculty of Law, and at Ecole doctorale, IRENEE- Institut de Recherches sur l’Evolution de la Nation et de l’Etat, Université de Lorraine, Nancy. Marija acts as a secretary at the Institute for Legal and Social Sciences at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law, and as deputy secretary of the Master 2 Program – Le Master 2 `Etudes Européennes`, Centre Européen Universitaire, Université de Lorraine in cooperation with the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law. Also, she participates in the implementation of the international scientific project Cluster of Excellence in European and International Law. She is listed as an official interpreter for UNHCR in Serbia for English and French language in the asylum procedure cases.

Dr Jožef Kunič is the honorary president of the Slovenian Association for International Relations (SDMO). He is the member of the International Institute for Middle East and Balkan Studies in Ljubljana. He received his PhD in Information Management sciences at the University of Ljubljana. He is a former Ambassador of Slovenia to France and Iran. He was MP at the Slovenian Assembly, where he was vice president of the parliamentary committee for foreign policy. After his retirement, he was the president of the SDMO. He is an associate professor at the European Centre for Peace and Development of the University for Peace established by the United Nations, for the field of Economic Diplomacy. His research and writing has focused on Slovenian foreign policy, the role of Slovenia in the Western Balkans, migrations in the Balkan Region, border problems in Southern Europe, interregional challenges and economic diplomacy, international problems relating to Iran, especially its nuclear program.

Prof. Ezio Benedetti is currently engaged as assistant to the chair and lecturer in EU Policies and EU Law within the Degree in International and Diplomatic Studies (Department of Social and Political Studies) of the University of Trieste. Since 2001, he has been associate professor and lecturer at the University of Trieste in EU Law, Public International Law and Human Rights. His scientific interests range from human rights to EU Law. He is currently engaged as senior key expert and team leader in two different EU funded projects in the Western Balkans (Bosnia and Herzegovina and Kosovo) implemented by the British Council. Both projects are focused on Higher Education and Public Administration Reform. Since October 2019, he has been engaged as an expert and consultant in the project ANETREC which is focused on academic cooperation and post conflict reconciliation in the region (6 academic partners from different WB countries). He published more than 30 articles and 3 books on EU integration issues, migration, human rights and Western Balkans accession process. Currently he is engaged as lecturer and researcher in Erasmus + Jean Monnet implemented by the Department of Social and Political Sciences of the University of Trieste. Since 2018, he provides regular seminars (twice a year) to ca. 40 students per year enrolled in the Advanced Master on South Eastern Studies organized by the University of Amsterdam, Department of Political Science.
