**Fjorda Shqarri** is a lecturer of International Law at the Department of Public Law (2010 – currently), Faculty of Law (University of Tirana). She obtained her Integrated Second Level Studies (2009) and PhD (2016) degrees from University of Tirana and completed postgraduate studies at the European University of Tirana (2010). In 2015, she got the academic title “docent” from the Council of Professors of Faculty of Law, UT. Her scientific interests are primarily international law, law of treaties, settlement of international disputes and international organizations, humanitarian law, EU law and integration. In addition, other interests include research of the treaty law institutions and Albanian practice, implementation of international law and international court decisions in the internal law system, legal reforms as a precondition for European integration and related issues. She teaches courses at undergraduate and graduate level: Public international law, International Organizations and Institutions, Humanitarian Law, European law and institutions. She is a founding member and currently holds the position of secretary general of the International Law Association, Albania branch. She has participated and presented in various international conferences in Albania and abroad, and published many scientific papers related to her research interests.

**Mirela Bogdani** is an associate professor at the Department of Public Law, University of Tirana, Faculty of Law (2000 - currently). Her primary fields of interest are EU foreign policy, EU integration, justice system reforms and rule of law, administration of electoral processes, academic and legal writing. She has completed her bachelor studies (2000), LL.M studies (2003) and PhD studies (2011) degrees from the University of Tirana. She has been a research scholar at “Washington College of Law”, American University & George Town University, Washington DC, USA (2007) and “Queen Mary” University of London, Centre for Commercial Law Studies and Arbitration. **Nedžma Džananović Miraščija** is a former Bosnian diplomat, now an associate professor at the University of Sarajevo’s Faculty of Political Science. She holds a bachelor’s degree in Political Science and a master’s degree in European Studies from London School of Economics and Political Science and University of Bologna, as well as a PhD in Political Science from University of Sarajevo. At the Political Science Department, she teaches courses at BA and MA levels which include: Diplomacy, Political System of the EU, EU Foreign Policy, Multilateral Diplomacy and International Organizations. In addition, she is a coordinator for the Erasmus + “euroPS” Project on behalf of UNSA (<http://euro-ps.org/>) and mentors a club that gathers advanced students of international relations called “Corps Diplomatique Students Club” (<https://cdfpnklub.wordpress.com>). She authored three books and a number of articles

published both locally and internationally, mainly in the field of contemporary international relations and diplomacy, EU integration process and EU Foreign Policy.

**Ružica Jakešević** is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies at the Faculty of Political Science (University of Zagreb). She obtained her MA (2004), M.Sc. (2008) and PhD (2011) degrees from the University of Zagreb. Her scientific and research interests are primarily international relations and security studies, theoretical approaches to security, traditional and contemporary security challenges, national security systems and policies, and their development in national and international context. In addition, these interests include research of the security mechanisms of global and regional international organizations (primarily the UN) in enhancing peace and security in the world, as well as studying the security aspects of ethnic relations and migration issues. She teaches courses at undergraduate and graduate level: International security, National security Policies, Croatia in the European security system, Migration and security at the Faculty of Political Science, as well as Peace support operations and Introduction into security and defence studies at the Croatian military academy "Dr. Franjo Tuđman". She actively participates and presents at international conferences in Croatia and abroad and has published a number of scientific papers in the field of international relations, security studies and ethnic studies.

**Siniša Tatalović** is a full professor at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb. His field of expertise is International Relations and Security Studies. He has been teaching at all levels (bachelor, master, PhD) at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb as a course coordinator for various subjects in field of Political Science, International Relations and Security Studies. He was a visiting professor at the University of Ljubljana from 2001 until 2004, and since 2011 he has been a visiting professor at the University of Belgrade. He has published several books among which are: *Globalna sigurnost i etnički sukobi* (Global Security and Ethnic Conflicts), 2010; *Suvremene sigurnosne politike* (Contemporary Security Policies), 2009; *Nacionalna i međunarodna sigurnost* (National and International Security), 2005; *Suvremeni sustavi nacionalne sigurnosti* (Contemporary National Security Systems), 2000. He has published numerous scientific articles and professional papers in national and international scientific journals.

**Đana Luša, PhD**, is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies, University of Zagreb, Faculty of Political Science. Her primary fields of interests are foreign policy, in particular foreign policies of small European states, IR theory and diplomacy. She served as the vice director of the Postgraduate Study of Foreign Policy and Diplomacy, the vice dean for Science and International Cooperation and an executive editor of the academic journal *Politička misao*. In 2020, she was elected the vice dean for academic and student affairs. During early stages of her career, she held a position of the secretary general of the Atlantic Council of Croatia and the Centre for International Studies as well as of the president of the Youth Atlantic Council of Croatia. Her teaching experience includes courses in International Relations, Diplomacy, US Foreign Policy and Transatlantic Relations at the undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate level. She serves as an institutional coordinator for e-learning and is an active mentor at the undergraduate and postgraduate level. Her extensive participation (more than 70 conferences and seminars) at the most

relevant international conferences in political science resulted in several publications (from 2003 onwards, she published one book and twenty-three papers or book chapters in peer-reviewed publications). Her publications are mostly focused on diplomacy, IR theory and migration policies of small states. She held invited lectures at Tehnokrat University, Indonesia, Bar Illan University, Israel, Vytautas Magnus University, Kaunas and others.

During her career she participated as a coordinator in several public diplomacy projects in cooperation with the Atlantic Treaty Association, Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, NATO Public Diplomacy Division, US Embassy and the European Academy from Berlin.

**Prof. Dr Iliriana Islami** is a professor of International Law at the Faculty of Law at the University of Prishtina, and responsible as vice dean on the issue of cooperation between Faculty of Law and other Universities including the responsibility of enhancing the quality of study program. At the same time, she is a coordinator of the Centre for Human Rights, as resource centre at the Faculty of Law. Beforehand, she served as a judge on the Constitutional Court, selected in the first generation of judges with the establishment of the Constitutional Court (2009-2012). Prior to joining the Constitutional Court, Mrs Islami has worked for the OSCE in the Department of Rule of Law and Human Rights from 2000-2009. During all this time, she was involved in the process of the reform of the Law Faculty, by being coordinator of the bachelor and master degree programmes through Tempus projects in cooperation with the Graz Faculty. Also, she is a lecturer for the Bar exam candidates since 2000. She holds a Ph.D. on International Law. Her thesis was supervised by Prof. Wolfgang Benedek from the Graz University. She completed her master's degree in the Bilkent University (American University) in Ankara (Turkey) and one year of specialization in Utrecht University (Netherlands). She holds a bachelor's degree from the Faculty of Law in Prishtina University. During studies, she was recognized by the rector as a "distinguished student". She is also an author of many publications.

**Valëza Ukaj Elshani** is a teaching assistant at the Faculty of Law, Public University of Pristina. She has obtained her bachelor's degree in Law in 2008 at the University of Pristina, LL.M in 2011 at the Catholic University of Leuven and in 2014 became a PhD candidate at the Clemson University (South Carolina, USA). She publishes her papers regularly in different academic journals and participates at international scientific conferences.

**Danijela Vuković-Ćalasan** is an associate professor at the Faculty of Political Sciences, University of Montenegro. She holds a master's degree in Political Science from the University of Belgrade and a PhD in Political Science from the University of Belgrade. She teaches courses on Political Theory, Globalization, Ethnicity and Ethnic Relation, Political Culture, Human Rights of Minority Groups and Ethnic Conflict Management. Her interests and specialization are in the following areas: International Relations and Diplomacy, Foreign Policy, Foreign Policy of the EU, Integration in the European Union (with specialization in the Balkans) EU Law and Politics, Refugees, Migration and Human Rights, International Law, Political Policies and Theories. She is a vice dean for International Cooperation and Science, and senator at the University Senate. She was granted ERASMUS+ fellowship grant for teaching mobility at the West University of Timisoara, Romania Faculty of Law 2017, was a CEEPUS Coordinator and is a member of International Scientific boards and journals.

**Mladen Karadzovski** is an associate professor in Public Administration. His research interests and specialization are in the areas of: Administrative Cooperation between the European States, European Integration of Macedonia and Western Balkans, Institutions of European Union, Enlargement Policy of the European Union, Regional Policy of the European Union, Common Foreign and Security Policy of the European Union, Cross-Border Cooperation, Local and Regional Development, Instruments for Pre-Accession. He was a visiting professor (SIGMA Program) at the University of Warsaw, Faculty of Political Sciences and Journalism, Institute of European Studies, in the winter semester (academic 2013/2014), for the subject: Western Balkan countries' accession towards the European Union. He is a co-founder of the Institute for Research and European Studies (IRES) - Bitola, established in 2013, and the

managing editor in the Journal of Liberty and International Affairs (JLIA) from 2014. He is also a member of the Advisory Board in the academic Journal Studia Europejskie (European Studies), Warsaw, Poland, from the 5<sup>th</sup> of June, 2014.

**Branko Rakić** attended elementary schools in Ivanjica and in Belgrade. He completed in 1974 and graduated from the XIIth High School in Belgrade in 1979. He received a degree from the Faculty of Law in Belgrade on 13<sup>th</sup> March 1987 (previously studied French Language and Literature at the Faculty of Philology in Belgrade). He passed his bar examination on 30<sup>th</sup> June 1989 and obtained a specialist diploma at the European University Centre in Nancy, France (Centre européen universitaire de Nancy) in December 1990 (University Diploma of the third degree) – a “Diploma of High European Studies” (“Diplôme d'études supérieures européennes”) in the field of European Community Law with the mark “mention honourable”. At the University Centre in Nancy (Centre européen universitaire de Nancy), he obtained an MA Diploma “Diploma of Further Studies” (“Diplôme d'études approfondies”) in the field of European Community Law, on 4<sup>th</sup> October 1991. The topic of the 309 pages long MA thesis was “Les aspects juridiques des relations entre la Yougoslavie d'une part et la Communauté européenne et le Conseil de l'Europe de l'autre” (Legal aspects of Relations between Yugoslavia, on the one hand, and the European Communities and the Council of Europe, on the other hand”). By Decision of the Scientific-Didactic Board of the Faculty of Law of the University of Belgrade of 12<sup>th</sup> February 1993, this diploma was recognised as a masters' degree in Law. On 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1999, he defended a doctoral thesis at Paris University I - Panthéon Sorbonne under the title: “La présence, les interactions et l'évolution des éléments politiques, économiques et juridiques dans les idées d'intégration européenne jusqu'à la création des Communautés européennes - à la lumière des approches modernes à la réalisation de la paix et du processus moderne d'intégration européenne” (“Presence, interaction and evolution of political, economic and legal elements in ideas of European integration prior to the establishment of the European Communities - in the light of modern approaches to the achievement of peace and modern European integration process”) with the mark “mention très honorable” thus obtaining the scientific degree of PhD in Law, in accordance with French regulations (Arrêté ministériel du 30 mars 1992 relatif aux études doctorales). By decision of the Scientific-Didactic Board of the Faculty of Law of the University of Belgrade of 20<sup>th</sup> December 1999, this diploma was declared equivalent and recognised as the scientific degree of PhD in Law.

**Marko Davinić** is full professor of Public Law at the Department of Public Law at the University of Belgrade's Faculty of Law. He has obtained his master's and PhD dissertation at the Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade. His main areas of research are Administrative Law, Public Administration and Asylum Law. He teaches several courses including EU Asylum and Immigration Law and Policy. He was Chevening scholar during his PhD research at the Oxford University (2006/07), and JFDP scholar at the George Washington University (2004/05). He participated as an expert on various domestic and international projects, and legal drafting groups. He has published numerous books and articles as an author and co-author in the area of national and comparative administrative law, independent control bodies and asylum law (e.g. *Independent Control Bodies of the Republic of Serbia*, Dosije, Belgrade, 2018; “The Institution of Local Ombudsman in the Republic of Serbia - Success Story or Missed

Krstić), *Lex localis*3/2018, 551 – 568; *The European Ombudsman and Maladministration*, Protector of Citizens, Belgrade, 2013; “The European Ombudsman – The Champion of Transparency within Brussels Bureaucracy”, *Annals of the Faculty of Law in Belgrade, Belgrade Law Review* 3/2013, 119 – 134; “Complexity of Ombudsman Institution Expansion Process”, *Law Journal of the Faculty of Law University of Niš* 2011, 101 – 111; “The Importance of the Ombudsman in the Legal System”, *Legal Life* 10/ 2007, 717 – 727; *The right to Asylum in International and National Law, Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade*, 2014 (co-author with prof. I. Krstić).

**Marija Vljaković**, LL.M. (master’s in European Integration, University of Belgrade Faculty of Law), LL.M. (Master 2 in European Studies, specialisation: Droit de la construction européenne, Centre Européen Universitaire de Nancy, Université de Lorraine) is an assistant lecturer at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law. She currently teaches Introduction to the European Integration Law, and takes part in LL.M Course Accession of Serbia to the European Union. Before academia, she gained practical experience in the Ministry of European Integration of the Republic of Serbia (Serbian European Integration Office), Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Serbia (Section for European Union), and Delegation of the European Union to the Republic of Serbia.
