Luljeta Ikonomi is an associate professor who holds the chair of Migration and Asylum Law at the Law Faculty, Tirana University. She holds an LL.M from Cambridge University specialized in Human Rights and International Law, and a PhD from the University of Tirana focused on Migrants' Rights. Her research interests lie in the area of migration and asylum law, human rights, and international law. She has been teaching the course of migration and asylum law since 2006 at the Law Faculty, Tirana University. In addition to teaching, Ms. Ikonomi has an extensive experience as senior legal expert on migration and asylum with several international organizations such as with IOM, OSCE, Save the Children and PAMECA. During 2014-2016, Ms. Ikonomi was involved in the research team of the Project 'Defining the Minimum Core of the Right to Health', implemented by the Dalla Lana School of the University of Toronto, focused on the right to health of migrants. She has published in various journals in the area of migration and asylum, including the International Journal of Human Rights (as co-author) and the British Journal of Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Law. She has also presented her research in the area of migration Conferences organized by elite universities such as University of Toronto, University of Galway in Ireland, Lund University, VU University Amsterdam. She is the recipient of several prestigious scholarships, including two Chevening Scholarships to pursue her LL.M studies at Cambridge University (2001-2002) and to conduct research as a visiting graduate at Oxford University (2010-2011).

Erlir Puto is an associated professor with a PhD from the Faculty of Law, University of Tirana, Albania . In 2014, he graduated in Law at the State University of Milano – Bicocca, Italy. He also finished the post-university School of law Professions in 2016 at the Milan State University, Italy. From 2018, he has been a lecturer and professor of Administrative and Constitutional Law at Tirana University – Faculty of Law. His PhD in 2013 was on European Administrative Law with the theme of Appropriateness of Foreign Normative and the European Union Normative in particular, into the Albanian Internal Legal and Administrative System". The subject handles different matters of application of the normative with EU background into the internal system of public administration and administrative judiciary. Particular emphasis is given to the issue of conflict of internal norms with those of the EU and the effects of this conflict over the validity of national administrative acts. In July 2016, he become an associated professor at the Faculty of Law at the University of Tirana. Professor Erlir Puto has published a big number of university books, scientific articles and participated in various scientific conferences in different countries.

Entela Nikaj, PhD, is a lecturer at the Faculty of Law, University of Tirana, Albania. In 2001, she got a degree in Law and in 2006 a degree in Political Science at the University of Bologna, Faculty of Political Science, Forli. In 2007, she finished a masters at the University of Bologna, Diplomatic Institute of the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and in 2015 a doctorate in Science, at the University of Pavia (Milan). Entela Nikaj's research activity is focused on the themes of European Law, Approximation of Legislation, Public Right, Studies on legal changes, constitutional changes due to the judicial reform. She researches the field of law by

interpreting recent implementations and amendments. She has 10 years of scientific research experience. She currently works as and adviser in the Approximation of Legislation in the Albanian Assembly, as a lecturer and researcher in the Public Law Department, Rule of Law, University of Tirana. She lectures at the Mediterranean University Acquis Communautaire, European procedural and civil law, and European Rights at the University of Vlora. She also lectures at several other universities. She is an expert of the Technical Secretariat of the Reform in the Justice of the Special Committee in the Albanian Assembly for the group for Higher Legal Education. She interns in the office of the Permanent Albanian Mission at the European Council in Strasbourg, France, and has authored several articles and presentations in national and international scientific activities.

Sarina Bakić is an associate professor, PhD, at the Department of Sociology at the University of Sarajevo's Faculty of Political Science. Her core scientific field is the sociology of culture and art, aesthetics, and various phenomena of mass culture. Furthermore, she is engaged in teaching on interculturalism, cultural sensitivity and cultural identities. She lectures on the following subjects: Department of Sociology: Sociology of Culture and Art (BA), Sociology of Organization (MA), Sociology of Everyday Life (MA); Department of Political Science: Culture and Diplomacy (BA) and Political Postmodern (MA). She is engaged in several projects as the project coordinator and member of project's team. She is an author of numerous scientific and professional articles that are published in national and international scientific publications. In addition, she has participated in various scientific conferences in Bosnia and Herzegovina and abroad. She is a member of the Board for Sociology at the Academy of Science and Art of Bosnia and Herzegovina, a member of the L'Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie (AUF) and University of Sarajevo representative in this Association. She speaks English, Hungarian, Spanish and French.

Mirza Emirhafizović is an associate professor at the Faculty of Political Sciences, University of Sarajevo, holds a PhD in Sociology (2014). He teaches courses both at BA and MA level, among others, Demography and Diaspora and Migration (in English). His research interests centre around population-related issues, migration, urban and rural studies. So far, he co-authored two books: *Emigration Study Bosnia and Herzegovina* (2019) and *Mapping the Needs of Single Parents in the Municipality of Centar Sarajevo* (2020) as well as several journal articles, book chapters and policy papers. He has participated in several research projects such as *Migration from Bosnia and Herzegovina* (2012-2013), *Migration and Development* (project led and funded by Ministry for Human Rights and Refugees BiH (Department for Diaspora), Embassy of Switzerland in BIH and UNDP) (2014), including various COST Actions (INTERFASOL IS1311, ROSEnet CA15122, ETHMIGSURVEYDATA CA16111, YOUNG-IN CA17114 etc.). He has made study visits at universities and institutes in the Netherlands (EUR, and SS The Hague), Spain (Spanish National Research Council - CSIC Madrid and Polibienstar Research Institute – University of Valencia), and Portugal (University of Porto - FPCEUP and University of Trás-os-Montes and Alto Douro - UTAD).

Ružica Jakešević is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies at the Faculty of Political Science (University of Zagreb). She obtained her

MA (2004), M.Sc. (2008) and PhD (2011) degrees from the University of Zagreb. Her scientific and research interests are primarily international relations and security studies, theoretical approaches to security, traditional and contemporary security challenges, national security systems and policies, and their development in national and international context. In addition, these interests include research of the security mechanisms of global and regional international organizations (primarily the UN) in enhancing peace and security in the world, as well as studying the security aspects of ethnic relations and migration issues. She teaches courses at undergraduate and graduate level: International security, National security Policies, Croatia in the European security system, Migration and security at the Faculty of Political Science, as well as Peace support operations and Introduction into security and defence studies at the Croatian military academy “Dr. Franjo Tuđman”. She actively participates and presents at international conferences in Croatia and abroad and has published a number of scientific papers in the field of international relations, security studies and ethnic studies.

Dana Luša, PhD, is an associate professor at the Department of International Relations and Security Studies, University of Zagreb, Faculty of Political Science. Her primary fields of interests are foreign policy, in particular foreign policies of small European states, IR theory and diplomacy. She served as the vice director of the Postgraduate Study of Foreign Policy and Diplomacy, the vice dean for Science and International Cooperation and an executive editor of the academic journal *Politička misao*. In 2020, she was elected the vice dean for academic and student affairs. During early stages of her career, she held a position of the secretary general of the Atlantic Council of Croatia and the Centre for International Studies as well as of the president of the Youth Atlantic Council of Croatia. Her teaching experience includes courses in International Relations, Diplomacy, US Foreign Policy and Transatlantic Relations at the undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate level. She actively participates at the most relevant international conferences in political science resulting with publications in international peer-reviewed journals. She is the author of a book *Contemporary Application of IR Theories*. Currently she is a researcher at two Erasmus + Jean Monnet Networks.

Siniša Tatalović was vice-dean of the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb, from 1999 to 2002. From 2008 to 2012, he was head of M.A. at the Faculty of Political Science. From 2006 to 2016, he was a director of the *Centre for International and Security Studies* at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb. From 2006 to 2014, he was head of the research project: *The Republic of Croatia in European Security Architecture*. He was co-leader of three regional bilateral research projects. First of them was *Systems of National Security in South–East Europe and challenged Security Threats*. This was a project between the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb, and the Faculty of Social Science, University of Ljubljana, and lasted for three years (2007-2010). The second one was *Security in South–East Europe* which lasted for two years (2009-2010) and was conducted by the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb, and the Faculty of Political Science, University of Belgrade. The third one was *Bilateral cooperation in the protection of minorities* (2011-2012). From 2003 to 2005, he was vice-president of the *Council for National Minorities of Republic of Croatia*. From 2005 to 2010, he was an advisor of the Croatian President for the political system. From 2010 to 2015, he was an advisor of the Croatian President for

domestic affairs. Also, he is the president of the scientific board of the International Scientific Conference Crisis Management Days in the organization of the University of Applied Science Velika Gorica. Until today, he has published several books, among others: *Globalna sigurnost i etnički sukobi*, Politička kultura, Zagreb, 2010; *Suvremene sigurnosne politike* (co-author), Golden marketing i Tehnička knjiga, Zagreb, 2009; *Nacionalna i međunarodna sigurnost*, Politička kultura, Zagreb, 2005; *Suvremeni sustavi nacionalne sigurnosti* (co-author), Fakultet političkih znanosti, Zagreb, 2000. He has published a few dozen scientific articles and professional papers in national and international scientific journals. He has been teaching on all levels (bacc., M.A., PhD) at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb, as a course coordinator for various subjects in the field of Political Science, International Relations and Security Studies. He was a visiting professor at the University of Ljubljana from 2001 to 2004 and at the University of Belgrade from 2011 until now.

Rober Mikač is an associate professor at the the Faculty of Political Science of the University of Zagreb. His area of speciality is, among others, migration challenges. He published two authored and four co-authored books in the field of security (published in Croatian, English and Macedonian) and over forty scholarly articles. From 2018, he has an editorial status at the publishing house Jesenski and Turk. During his career in the Armed Forces of the Republic of Croatia, he served as a soldier, non-commissioned officer and commissioned officer. For two years, he worked in the unit for the protection of VIP persons, five years as an operational officer in the antiterrorist military police and his last position was a military police company commander. During this period, he worked on very demanding tasks and participated in a NATO mission ISAF in Afghanistan as a commander of the international military police platoon within the Kabul Multinational Brigade. Afterwards, he was the head of the State Centre 112, the body responsible for monitoring all emergency situations and conditions in the state and neighbourhood on daily basis, coordinating the activities of emergency services. For two years, he worked as an independent police inspector within the Ministry of the Interior, primarily in the work of harmonization of national regulations and legislation with the EU Acquis Communautaire during the accession phase of the Republic of Croatia into full membership. He spent four years as commander of Civil Protection of the Republic of Croatia and actively participated in solving numerous natural and humanitarian national and regional crises and disasters – from fires, floods to a major migration crisis in 2015.

Marta Zorko is an associate professor at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb. She holds a PhD in the area of International Relations and National Security with her thesis on open border issues of republic of Croatia. She teaches Political Geography and Geopolitics as well as Contemporary Geopolitical Issues on undergraduate level, Migrations and Security on graduate level, Geopolitics and Security on postgraduate level at the Faculty of Political Science, and Geopolitics of Strategic Resources on the PhD level at the Faculty of Economic and Business. She has been teaching Political Geography and Geopolitics at Croatian Military Studies as well. She served for three years (2014 – 2017) as vice-dean for Academic and Student Affairs, served for the same time as graduate chair for MA in Political Science, served for four years (2010 – 2014) as deputy graduate chair for MA in Security Studies, and

still serving (since 2014) as the faculty representative in the Council for Military Studies. She is an executive editor of the specialized yearbook called Forum for Security Studies, a member of the *International Political Science Association*, a board member of IPSA Research Committee 15 (Political and Cultural Geography, 2018-2020), a member of the *Croatian Political Science Organization* and a member of *Association for Borderland Studies*. She published a book *Geopolitics and Territoriality* in 2018, as well as over twenty scientific articles in the area of Political Geography, Security Studies and Border Studies. She has participated in over fifty international conferences delivering her thesis and organized over ten conferences in Croatia.

Bashkim Preteni is a teaching assistant and an authorised lecturer in Civil Law Department at the Law Faculty of the University of Prishtina “Hasan Prishtina”. His scientific specialisation is oriented in Law of Obligations, Contract Law, Commercial Contracts and Notarial Law. Currently, he is appointed in the position of the secretary of the Institute for Research and Legal Studies, which is the main institute of the Law Faculty. He has concluded the basic studies and an LL.M at the Law Faculty of the University of Prishtina. During the basic studies he was awarded the “distinguished student” title (equivalent with: summa cum laude) by the University for his outstanding academic results in the field of law. He finished the doctoral studies at the Law Faculty of the University of Cologne, Germany. His dissertation treats the impact of contract law in transfer of immovables under Kosovo law. His professional experience is enriched holding several positions like national legal representative of the Swiss Institute for Notarial Studies (I-H-N) in the project “Kosovo Notary System”, acting dean of the Law Faculty at the University of Mitrovica “Isa Boletini”, local expert of the Project “Kosovo Civil Code – Phase II”. He has published several national and international books and articles from the field of private law.

Puka Avni is a professor at the Law Faculty of the University of Prishtina. She graduated from the Faculty of Law University of Prishtina in 2005. She completed her master’s in Criminal Sciences at the same faculty in 2008. She has a PhD in Criminal law from the Faculty of Law University of Pristhina in 2016 and a PhD in Criminal Law and Procedure from the University of Rome “La Sapienza” in 2017. Avni Puka teaches Criminal Law, Criminal Law-Special Part, International Criminal Law, European Criminal Law and Comparative Criminal Law. She is a member of the Independent Expert Group to design the guiding principles, scenarios and elements of the Reform of the Vetting in the Justice System of Kosovo since February 2020; a member of the State Commission for drafting the Criminal Code of Kosovo from 2016 to 2018); a member of the Association Internationale de Droit Pénal/ International Association of Penal Law- AIDP/IAPL, Paris/France, (Representative of the AIDP-Albanian National Group and Collective Member of Kosovo since 2010; a member of the Conditional Release Panel (Kosovo Judicial Council) from 2013 to 2016; a member of the Scientific Council at “*Centro Studi, Alta Formazione e Ricerca Italo-Albanese – CESIAL*” (Rome / Italy) since 2016; an expert and member of the Commission for drafting of the Law on Liability of Legal Persons for Criminal Offences, Ministry of Justice-Government of the Republic of Kosovo in 2011; and a member of the Commission for Pardon of the Convicted Persons, Office of the President of the Republic of Kosovo (2011).

Danijela Vuković-Ćalasan is an associate professor at the Faculty of Political Sciences, University of Montenegro. She holds a master's degree in Political Science from the University of Belgrade and a PhD in Political Science from the University of Belgrade. She teaches courses on Political Theory, Globalization, Ethnicity and Ethnic Relation, Political Culture, Human Rights of Minority Groups and Ethnic Conflict Management. Her scientific fields of interests are ethnic and national relations and identities, globalization and contemporary political theories, including theory and politics of multiculturalism. She did a research at the Political Science Institute, University of Vienna. She was a visiting professor within ERASMUS+ programme at Opole University, Poland, and within the same programme at the *University of Beira Interior, Covilhã, Portugal*. Vuković-Ćalasan is the author of a monography and several scientific papers.

Mehmed Đečević is an assistant professor, born in Podgorica, 11th February 1983. He completed his primary education in Podgorica, where he also obtained his high school degree from the Gymnasium "Slobodan Škerović". He then studied psychology at the Faculty of Philosophy in Sarajevo, and obtained his degree within the prescribed timeframe. Upon returning to Podgorica, he enrolled in a postgraduate programme at the Faculty of Political Sciences (Social Politics and Social Work), which he completed with a master's thesis exploring the motives of migration of highly qualified professionals from Montenegro. While he was pursuing his master's degree, he completed his internship at the Psychiatric Clinic of the Clinical Centre of Montenegro. In 2008, Mehmed started working as an associate professor at the Faculty of Political Sciences, and in 2010, he enrolled into doctoral studies at the same faculty. Simultaneously, he was attending education on psychotherapy, which he completed in 2016, and obtained a degree in Gestalt psychotherapy. At the end of 2017, Đečević successfully defended his doctoral thesis, which explores the socio-genetic factors of mental disorders in Montenegro.

Nemanja Stankov is a teaching assistant at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Montenegro and a PhD candidate at the Doctoral School for Political Science, Public Policy and International Relations at Central European University. In his work, he focuses on political behaviour and patterns of electoral support for right-wing political parties. His research includes micro and macro-level explanations ranging from psychological dispositions towards authoritarian personality, to religiosity, minority parties and political salience of ethnic and migration issues within political systems.

Vladimir Ortakovski is a full professor of International Law and his major fields of research are Public International Law, International Humanitarian Law, Diplomacy and International Security. He is a full professor of Public International Law at the Faculty of Security - Skopje, University "St. Kliment Ohridski"– Bitola. Professor Vladimir Ortakovski graduated in 1974 from the Faculty of Political Sciences in Belgrade with a degree in International Politics. He obtained his LL.M. (in 1983) and LL.D. (in 1986) in International Law and International Relations at the Faculty of Law in Belgrade. In 1989, he was promoted to docent, in 1994 to associate professor, in 1997 and in 2001 to full professor at the Faculty of Security in Skopje. Prof. Ortakovski was dean at the Faculty of Security from 2004-2008.

He was deputy minister for Science in the Government of the Republic of Macedonia from 1993 to 1996. Prof. Ortakovski is member of international academic societies and institutions, including American Society of International Law (ASIL), since 1995; Institute for International Humanitarian Law (IIHL) in San Remo (Italy), since 1999, etc.

He has written extensively and has published over 240 bibliographic units consisting of scientific and specialist publication in journals and newspapers, papers at symposia and scientific gatherings in Macedonia and abroad. He participated in around 80 international conferences, round tables, symposiums, presenting his papers. Prof. Ortakovski is the author of seven books and six university textbooks and manuals. He was awarded the state prize “Goce Delchev” for the best scientific publication in 1996 for his book “The International Position of Minorities”. His book “Minorities in the Balkans” was published by “Transnational Publishers, Inc.”, Ardsley, New York, in 2000.

Goran Ilik, PhD, is an associate professor and dean of the Faculty of Law at “St. Kliment Ohridski” University in Bitola (North Macedonia). His academic background includes a BA in Law (International Law and International Relations), an MA in Political Sciences (European Union Studies) and a PhD in Political Sciences with the specific interest in the European Union foreign, security and defence policy. The publication list contains papers, chapters and monographs emphasizing the role of the European Union in international relations, the institutional architecture of its foreign policy, the EU axiological performances and its international political power. Also, many papers treat the EU role in the new international context in relation to the contemporary challenges of the liberal world order and the EU’s role and place in it. He is the author of books “Europe at the crossroads: The Treaty of Lisbon as a basis of European Union international identity” and “EUtopia: the international political power of the EU in the process of ideologization of the post-American world”. Dr Goran Ilik is a co-founder of the Institute for Research and European Studies – Bitola and editor-in-chief of the international academic journal “Journal of Liberty and International Affairs” (www.e-jlia.com).

Elena Tilovska-Kechedji, PhD, is an associate professor in political science and diplomacy. Her interests and specialization are in the following areas: International Relations and Diplomacy, Foreign Policy, Foreign Policy of the EU, Integration in the European Union (with specialization in the Balkans) EU Law and Politics, Refugees, Migration and Human Rights, International Law, Political Policies and Theories. She is a vice dean for International Cooperation and Science, and senator at the University Senate. She was granted ERASMUS+ fellowship grant for teaching mobility at the West University of Timisoara, Romania Faculty of Law 2017, was a CEEPUS Coordinator and is a member of International Scientific boards and journals.

Mladen Karadzovski is an associate professor in Public Administration. His research interests and specialization are in the areas of: Administrative Cooperation between the European States, European Integration of Macedonia and Western Balkans, Institutions of European Union, Enlargement Policy of the European Union, Regional Policy of the European Union, Common Foreign and Security Policy of the European Union, Cross-Border Cooperation, Local and Regional Development, Instruments for Pre-Accession. He was a visiting professor

(SIGMA Program) at the University of Warsaw, Faculty of Political Sciences and Journalism, Institute of European Studies, in the winter semester (academic 2013/2014), for the subject: Western Balkan countries' accession towards the European Union. He is a co-founder of the Institute for Research and European Studies (IRES) - Bitola, established in 2013, and the managing editor in the Journal of Liberty and International Affairs (JLIA) from 2014. He is also a member of the Advisory Board in the academic Journal Studia Europejskie (European Studies), Warsaw, Poland, from the 5th of June, 2014.

Ivana Krstić is an associate professor of International Human Rights Law and director of the Human Rights Centre at the University of Belgrade's Faculty of Law. She obtained her LLM (2003) at the School of Law, University of Pittsburgh (USA), along with an LLM (2004) and PhD (2008) at the University of Belgrade's Faculty of Law. In the academic year 2006/2007, she did her PhD research at the Exeter College, Oxford University. She is teaching several courses, including EU Non-Discrimination Law, Minority Rights and Gender Studies. Since 2010, she has been a coordinator of the Non-Discrimination Legal Clinic. Her area of specialty is Anti-Discrimination Law. Since September 2012, she has been a member of the Serbian Asylum Commission, a second instance body deciding on asylum applications. She is also a member of the Serbian Council for Child Rights and the Serbian Republic Commission for Transgender Persons. As an expert, she is engaged in different projects concerning different aspects of human rights and discrimination issues, run by several international organizations and agencies, such as the OHCHR, UNWOMEN, IOM, UNHCR, UNDP and OSCE. Since October 2018, she has been a member of an expert group drafting the Antidiscrimination strategy. Also, she collaborates very closely with the Commissioner for the Protection of Equality, giving expert advice on complex discrimination issues, and takes part in training judges and other public officials on different discrimination aspects. She is a Serbian legal expert on gender equality and non-discrimination in the European Equality Law Network. She has published several monographs and textbooks, around 30 handbooks and more than 50 articles in the area of International Human Rights Law, International Refugee Law, Non-Discrimination Law and International Public Law. Some of her publications are: *The prohibition of discrimination in international and national law*, Belgrade, Faculty of Law, 2018; *European Human Rights Law*, Belgrade, 2016 (with prof. Dr T. Marinkovic); *Commentary of the European Convention on Human Rights* (prof. Dr D. Popovic /ed./), 2017; *The right to Asylum in International and National Law*, Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade, 2014 (co-author with prof. M. Davinic).

Marko Davinić is full professor of Public Law at the Department of Public Law at the University of Belgrade's Faculty of Law. He has obtained his master's and PhD dissertation at the Faculty of Law, University of Belgrade. His main areas of research are Administrative Law, Public Administration and Asylum Law. He teaches several courses including EU Asylum and Immigration Law and Policy. He was Chevening scholar during his PhD research at the Oxford University (2006/07), and JFDP scholar at the George Washington University (2004/05). He participated as an expert on various domestic and international projects, and legal drafting groups. He has published numerous books and articles as an author and co-author in the area of national and comparative administrative law, independent control bodies and asylum law (e.g. *Independent Control Bodies of the Republic of Serbia*, Dosije,

Bojana Čučković is an associate professor of Public International Law and Human Rights Law at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law. She has a PhD in Public International Law obtained at the University of Belgrade Faculty of Law in 2012, and she holds an LLM degree in International Law and International Organizations acquired at Paris I Pantheon-Sorbonne University (France) in 2006.
